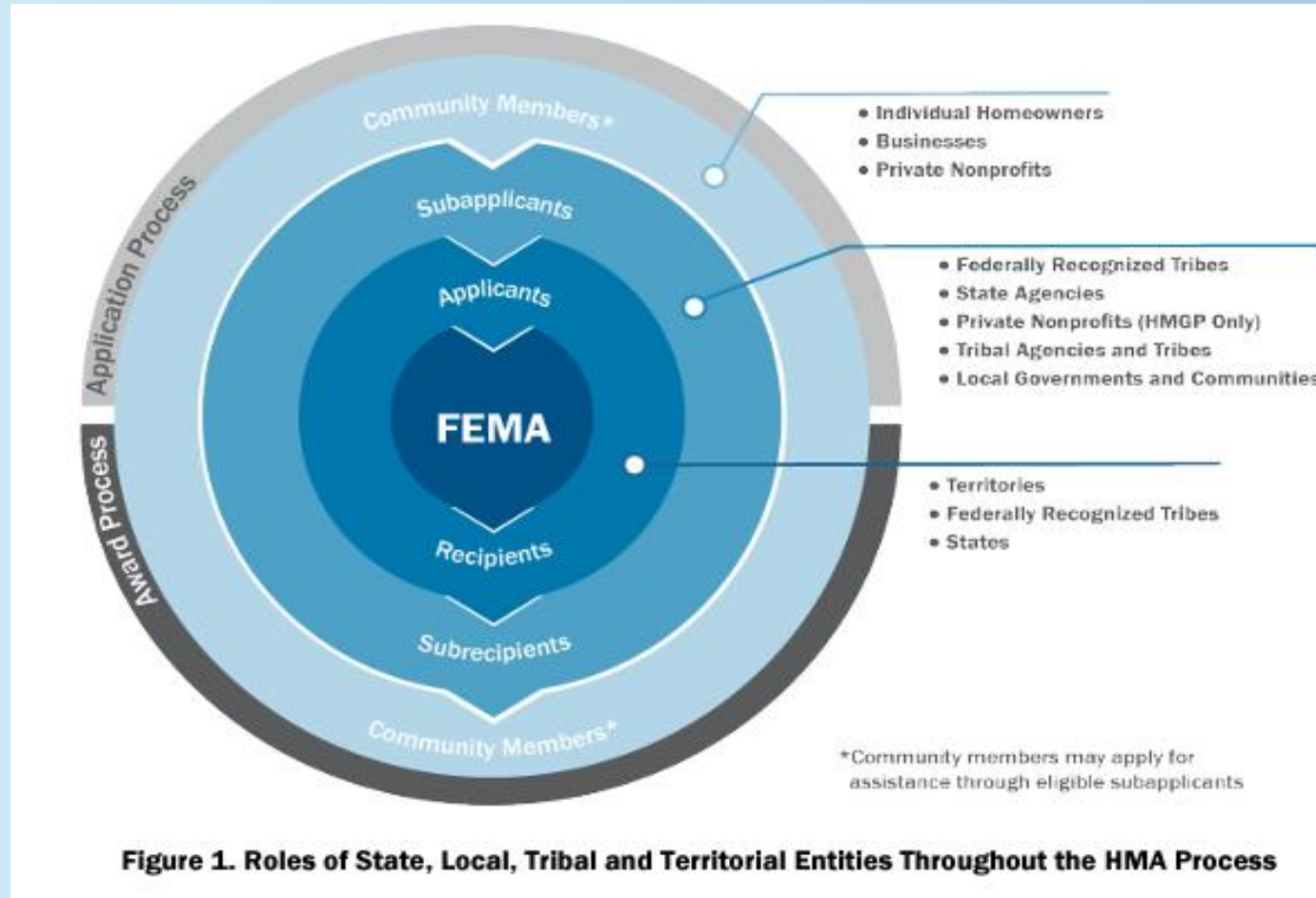

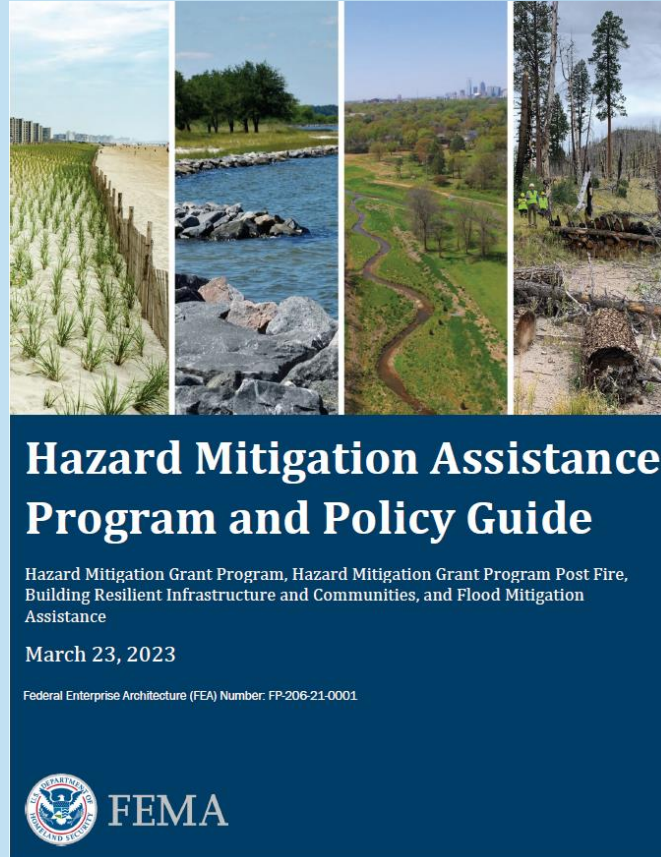

# Non-Disaster Grant Programs

## Building Resilient Infrastructure & Communities (BRIC)

Annual, nationally competitive grant with \$2-3 Billion in available funding

Large scale infrastructure projects supporting critical facilities/functions, acquisition- demolition, elevation, localized flood risk reduction projects, project scoping C&CB and adoption/enforcement of the latest published editions of building codes.

Be Cost-effective

Reduce or eliminate risk & damage from future natural hazards

Meet either of the latest published editions of relevant consensus-based codes, specifications and standards

Align with the applicable hazard mitigation plan (HMP)

Meet all Environmental and Historic Preservation (EHP) requirements

A Hydrologic & Hydraulic Study is required to assess the impact of the localized flood risk reduction activities to the benefitting area



# Non-Disaster Grant Programs

## Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA)

Annual, nationally competitive grant with average \$800 Million in available funding

Under FMA, projects should benefit NFIP-insured properties. Proof of NFIP coverage, including the flood insurance policy, is required. Located in a participating [NFIP Community](#) (In good standing)

Eligible activities include acquisition, elevation, mitigation reconstruction, dry floodproofing

Federal Cost Share  
SRL 100%   RL 90%   NFIP 75%

# Ineligible Projects

- Projects that address unmet needs from a disaster that are **not related to mitigation** (tree removal)
- Activities that only address **manmade hazards**
- **Preparedness measures and response equipment**
- **Temporary measures** (e.g., sandbags, bladders, geotubes)
- Projects that **do not reduce the risk** to people, structures, or infrastructure.

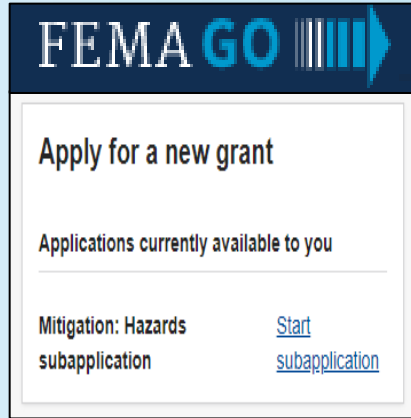

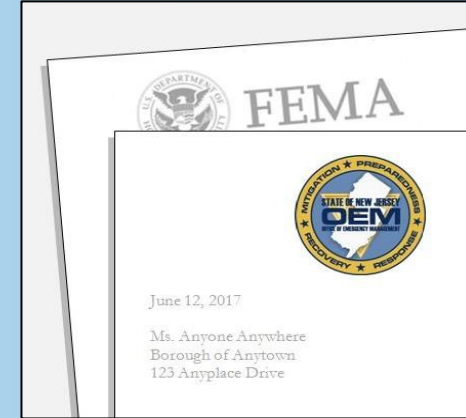




# How to Apply

- ❖ Registration Process
  1. Notify the New Jersey Office of Emergency Management Mitigation Unit that you want to register for FEMA GO and provide your organization's **Unique Entity ID Number**.
  2. NJOEM Mitigation Unit will enter the provided organization's number and make them an eligible sub-applicant under the State of New Jersey within FEMA GO.
  3. Individuals associated with the Organization may now register on the FEMA GO website however, additional approval within your own organization may be required.
  4. Once an individual is approved within their organization, they should contact the NJOEM Mitigation Unit who can now give the individual access rights to create a sub-application.

**Examples of mitigation include:**

- Promoting sound land use planning based on known community hazards
- Adopting, and enforcing building codes and standards
- Using fire-retardant materials in new construction
- Buying flood insurance to protect personal property and belongings
- Securing shelves and water heaters to walls
- Elevating structures above the floodplain
- Retrofitting highway overpasses to withstand earthquakes
- Strengthening parapet walls on old masonry buildings
- Anchoring bookcases in schools, libraries, and offices
